





Ron Elliott Elected as the 97th Potentate

onald M. Elliott was elected our 97th Potentate of Murat Shrine at the annual meeting held on Monday, December 17, 2007. He was appointed to the Divan of Murat Temple by Potentate John A. Friend, Sr. Ron has served as committee chairman for Budget, Safety & Security, 500 Festival and House & Grounds. He has also served as an Imperial representative and has been an executive aide, Potentate's aide, and hospitality chairman for many past Potentates. He is currently an Imperial Marshal's aide and serves on the board of governors at the Shriners Hospital for Children in Cincinnati.

Ron was born in Indianapolis on April 1, 1943, the oldest of three children. He attended Indianapolis Public Schools and graduated from Warren Central High School. Professionally, Ron was a firefighter with the Indianapolis Fire Department. Before joining the fire department, he worked as a carpet installer for Penney's, Block's and Sears, as well as many interior decorators. After becoming a fireman, Ron opened his own carpet business, where he worked when he wasn't on duty at the firehouse. He would take his vacation days during the month of May and would be on the Fire Crew at the Indianapolis Motor Speedway. He held several positions while on the fire department, which included public relations officer, chauffer to three district chiefs, and retired in 1994 with the rank of lieutenant. Ron went on to work for the Marion County Sheriff's Department in the Civil Office for two years.

Ron has always been very active in the community. He has served on the board of directors for the Muscular Dystrophy Foundation, United Christmas Service Organization, IFD Clothe A Child Committee, and was on the 500 Festival Committee as a parade marshal for many years. He belongs to the Indianapolis Retired Firefighters Club, Tau Kappa Epsilon, and is a Kentucky Colonel.

In June of 1973 Ron was initiated into Brookside Lodge #720. He joined the Scottish Rite Valley of Indianapolis in November 1973 and in December of that same year he became a Noble of Murat Shrine. He is also a member of Prather York Rite.

Ron is an active member of the Murat Firemen's Club and served as president in 1983 and 1995. He is a past president of Kowad 'Al Sabikin and a past parade marshal in the 500 Shrine Club, where he drove a parade car for many years.

Other memberships include Murat Police Club, Gun Club, Motor Corps, VCM, Mobil Nobles, Order of the Q, El' Ameen Nabeel, Hillbilly Clan #14, and Knights of Venus. He is a past director of the Royal Order of Jesters and is an honorary member of the Reception Unit, Corvette Club, Chanters, Band and was named an Old Fart Emeritus by the NexGen Unit. 





Atholl Brose

Highlander on assignment "Wee Willie" Stanton was kind enough to forward me his recipe for Atholl Brose. He notes that this is the favored beverage for first footers at Hogmanay. Hogmanay is a Scottish word for the last day of the year, or what we celebrate as New Year's Eve. First footing is the old practice of being the first visitor to cross a friend or neighbor's threshold after midnight of Hogmanay. First footers bear symbolic gifts to bring luck to the householder.

There are a number of variations in making this drink, which have been handed down over many generations. The brew is first recorded in 1475 when the Earl of Atholl was attempting to capture Iain MacDonald, Lord of the Isles who was leading a rebellion against the king. Hearing that MacDonald drank from a small well, the Earl ordered it to be filled with honey, whisky and oatmeal. MacDonald stayed, sampling the concoction, and was captured!

Here is "Wee Willie's" Atholl Brose recipe:

Ingredients:

3 rounded tablespoons of Irish or Scottish Medium oatmeal

2 tablespoons heather honey



Single Malt Scotch whisky

Method:

The oatmeal is prepared by putting it into a basin and mixing with cold water until the consistency is that of a thick paste. Leave for half an hour and then put through a fine strainer, pressing with a wooden spoon to extract as much liquid as possible. Throw away the oatmeal and use the creamy liquor from the oatmeal for the brose.

Mix four dessert spoonfuls of pure honey and four sherry glassfuls of the prepared oatmeal and stir well using a silver spoon. Put into a quart bottle and fill with malt whisky; shake before serving. Enjoy!

This article will be about one of the most valuable members the Murat Shrine Band has had the privilege of knowing in the history of the Band, the oldest unit in Murat, which began in 1897. A Band article appeared in the Murat Magazine in 1999 written by Don Bottles. It tells the story of Noble Leonard Hull far better than I could.

"In the military, as one performs life threatening actions above and beyond the line of duty, he may be awarded the Congressional Medal of Honor. As an individual acts in the service of world mankind, he might be awarded the Nobel Peace Prize. As a brother Mason acts and serves the fraternity, he is recognized by earning the highest award as he dons the white and gold "bellhop" gear of the 33rd Degree Mason. All are honorable and above and beyond the call of duty.

In the oldest unit in the world's largest Shrine, the Murat Concert Band, an award of no less significance is the "Murat Band Nobility Award." As installation party chairman for many years, he nearly completed the impossible promotions, themes, decorations, entertainment, MC, location, menus, etc.

He built a 16 ft. gondola; a Ford Tri Motor model airplane with an 18 ft. wingspan; a one-third scale medicine wagon; three full size 18 wheeler tractor-trailer models (front, rear and 40 ft. profile); a 16 ft. alligator, two full size Civil War cannons, just to name a few. Always to reflect on the theme of the Band president-elect.

He totally refurbished the air calliope, built a carriage for its transportation, designed the fan and a remote control for the new generator. He was cochairman for 13 Mystery Dinner trips. He designed the Band's 40 ft. parade trailer and pulled it to parades throughout the U.S. and Canada (estimated 30,000 miles).

He has been Scribe for at least 26 years (eight years added to original figure), writing the very first "Band Notes" monthly member publication (and the last one in November 2007), written, copied and folded for mailing by this



devoted brother. He also writes articles for the Shrine magazine and Shrine Bandmasters Association of North America's quarterly publication. I asked him if he would serve as the Band chaplain at dinners, funerals and special functions. His response, as usual, 'I Would be honored.' Any idea created by this brother was always for the enhancement of the Band and carried through to completion in a big way.

This very eager to serve Band member served on the board of directors as often and as many times as the bylaws allowed. He has served as secretary three times; treasurer and second vice president twice; first vice president twice; and served as Band president in 1982 and 1994.

When I asked his formula for success, he says:

- 1. I'm a dedicated husband, father, grandfather, great-grandfather, a patriot and Shriner.
- 2. You're honoring me for the people I love and things I love to do.
- 3. It is not me you should be honoring but the dedicated supporting cast who would not let me fail.

As you walk these hallowed halls of Murat Temple and you haven't met this devoted brother, you'll know him when he passes. He's the one behind that big smile.

I know I speak for all Bandsmen when I say, 'I am really happy and very proud I played in the Murat Band with our great brother, Leonard Hull.' "

Thank you, Don, for such a wonderful tribute to Leonard. Now let's hear from Leonard in his own words as he reminisces about earlier Past Presidents parties.

"As Band Party chairman, I requested all Past Presidents to reflect not only on their year but what the Murat Band has meant to them throughout the year.

I personally have had so many great and positive things happen since I joined in 1973. It's difficult to elaborate, so just itemizing, I'll start when Dave Thrasher invited me to try my luck after a 30-year layoff (on trumpet that is).

My first Imperial Session was Toronto 1975; Joe Woodfill, Potentate, and Doc Ping, president. Don Sherry and I were the only rookies. I cleaned out 33 floors of ice machines for the Band hospitality room and the Band furnished ice for all the Murat Units. The greatest parade I've ever been in. People lined the streets 6 to 10 deep on both sides of the street for five miles. We played 'O Canada' at 11 a.m. in front of the reviewing stand, and I instructed Ken Shepherd on the use of the bidet."

The next few paragraphs have been covered in the above article by Don Bottles so with Leonard's approval they will be omitted.

"During Frank Worden's term as president, the board of directors decided to put the Band on wheels. As noted in Ivan Frakes' article, the average age in the Band was about 40 years. In 1986, the average age was 67. In 1994, the average age, even with new, younger members, was 69. A dream Morris Stealcup never got to realize. A total Band effort to design and build to our specs, with in-house talent. (See more details under President Barton 1990.)"

The trailer, which Leonard named "Worden's Wagon," has been given a new and fitting label by yours truly, "The Worden-Hull Wagon." More miles were added on the beautiful edifice to the Hull legacy. Today, December 1, the Murat Shrine Band performed in a Christmas parade in Wanamaker, IN, wearing long johns, stocking caps, winter coats and gloves. Now back to Leonard:

"We refurbished the air calliope,

built a remote control for a new generator, carriage, fan, etc. for circus promotion

Train, water tower, railroad hats at Roland's first trip in the barrel over the falls in 1989.

Because of dedicated people, the quotation on every penny I pinch exemplified the Murat Band: 'E Pluribus Unum' (motto of the United States) – 'One Out of Many.'

It has been my privilege to serve the Murat Band and as I tenured my office in the Centennial Year of this grand Unit in the largest Shrine in the world, I would just like to say thanks for letting me be the nut that held the wheels on the band wagon in 1994. To me, a WW II veteran, the melody of 'Taps' is second only to the Lord's Prayer.

If any member of this great organization hasn't benefited by the positive, he has lost more than his ears. It's what's between them that counts.

'So mote it be.' " Leonard E. Hull



For the information of our readers, Leonard has had numerous health problems and bounced back. He is currently scheduled for heart catheterization. If the results are as we hope and pray they will be, Leonard will be judged able to undergo pain relieving back surgery. If this blessed event can be successfully completed, who knows, we may again under the heading of Band see the name of Scribe, Leonard Hull.






Retention will be stressed at the Club and Unit meetings. Every member you get active is another member for you as well as for Murat. Let's hold onto every member and not let them slip away.

She described what inspired her to achieve greatness.

She is currently on a national book tour to promote her most recent title *How Strong Woman Pray* where she weaves her personal story of remarkable perseverance with the stories of amazing women, like Maya Angelou, Kathie Lee Gifford, Barbara Bush, and Kathy Ireland, who find strength and power in the healing aspects of prayer.

"I've been able to overcome tremendous challenges because people along the way helped me push through 'limits'," she said. "Now it's my turn to make a difference in the lives of others."

With her exceptional "can-do" attitude, former Shriners' patient Bonnie St. John reminds us that anything is possible!


Bill Rasner appointed Outer Guard for 2008
