



"Your Biggest Fan is ME!"

t the Imperial Council Session, Megan Johnson spoke to a very large crowd of nobles and their ladies. She inspired everyone in the room. Later, she danced with actor John Stamos during the Beach Boys concert. But there is much more to Megan than speaking to groups or dancing. As Paul Harvey would say, here is "the rest of the story."

Megan was born in Dae Goo, South Korea. The severity of her cleft palate caused her to be placed in foster care. It took the adoption agency three months to decide whether she could be placed for adoption. Megan says, "My cleft went all the way to the brain, and I was actually leaking brain fluid out my nose. Doctors were very concerned about meningitis." At the same time, a couple in Portland, OR, sought to adopt a child. That couple confirms they were happy to receive a picture of Megan because, "We knew we were getting our little girl."

Megan was seven months old when she arrived at her new home. She is the only girl in the family. Her parents have one son by birth, one adopted son from Costa Rica, and a son from Korea. Megan, in her inimitable style, smiles and says, "How did I get stuck with three stinkin' brothers?" Privately, she admits she loves her entire family.

Megan's first surgery was at age 10 months, followed by four more surgeries that year. Prior to coming to Shriners Hospital, she had several surgical procedures in other hospitals, including several cleft lip and palate surgeries, work on her eyelids, and surgery to improve her hearing. She developed a strong fear and dislike for hospitals. She says, "I was traumatized. I hated hospitals, doc-



tors, nurses and anything that resembled a hospital. When I was 5, I was in a little singing group that performed at a Shriners Hospital's volunteer lunch. The care coordinator told my mother she realized I had a hemifacial condition and suggested she make application for treatment. I became the first patient in the area with my specific type of surgery, and several Portland area doctors observed the surgery."

Knowing Megan's fear of hospitals, the staff wisely paired Megan with Allison, a child life worker who thoroughly explained the planned surgery and helped Megan become very familiar with the operating room and other parts of the hospital. Megan says, "I expected to hate this hospital as much as I hated all other hospitals, but I couldn't. Doctors and staff answer all our questions and make the patient feel at ease. I fell in love with the people and everything about it. It is truly a different kind of hospital. It's my favorite place in the world."

Megan's medical problems do not end with her hemifacial condition and the cleft lip and palate. At Shriners Hospital, she had midface distraction, bone grafting and several other procedures. The right side of her body grows more quickly than the left side, necessitating shoe lifts to accommodate one short leg. She had tissue removed from the right chest area because it was pulling on her back, intensifying her spinal curvature. The syndrome caused her pinkie fingers to be, as Megan says, "Way too short. When I play the piano, I move those fingers out of joint to reach the octaves. There is always a way to overcome my birth defects. It never stops me!"

Doctors have told Megan she needs other surgery. She is scheduled for another midface distraction with possible grafting to stabilize facial bones. Her nose is to be completely rebuilt. The distraction surgery will affect her speech and may require a pharyngeal flap or thickening the throat. She will have lip revision. She has only half the normal number of teeth, and will have some teeth implanted and others capped. A full evaluation will be made after all those procedures.

Because of severe harassment by students in fourth grade, Megan's mother home schooled her. She returned to public school in ninth grade and has maintained a 4.0 GPA in her first two years of high school. She began 11th grade this year and tested into Running Start, which allows her to attend college now and receive both college and high school credits. When she graduates from high school, she will have attained all required nursing prerequisites.

Is Megan an active person? Each month, she visits from one to four states as a patient ambassador, speaking to many groups about Shriners Hospitals. She has a Red Belt with two stripes in Tai Kwon Do, and the next step is Black Belt, which was delayed because of surgeries. She has been a Girl Scout since first grade. In third grade, she completed a Kids Helping Kids project and earned a bronze award by collecting videos for five area children's hospitals. She earned a Silver Award by making blankets for babies of drug addicts, and is now working on a Gold Award. She plays piano, violin and Korean drums. She is an artist and award-winning photographer. She has written and illustrated three children's books. At age 10, she started "Megan's Mission." She has 30 volunteers helping distribute blankets she personally makes for street people. She works with the Salvation Army,

Union Gospel Mission and Multi-Service Center to help the homeless. She has made more than 1,000 blankets, having fundraisers to buy materials.

Megan has goals - (1) to visit all 22 Shriners Hospitals (10 down and the 11th to be in October), (2) to become a hospital clown (clown name is Lollypop), (3) to become a registered (4) to work in a Shriners Hospital, and (5) to write three more children's books in the "Don't Mess With Meggie" series. Proceeds from book sales go to Shriners Hospitals and other worthy causes.

jewelry to gourmet foods and coffees. You will also have many opportunities to win some nice things.



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We all enjoy showing others the Murat building and Shriners Hospitals. It is important to follow proper procedures when doing both.

Tours of Murat: Advance notice is not necessary when taking friends and relatives on tours of Murat's two-story building during office hours. The situation is a little different if we want to tour the theater side, since we need to be certain no theater production or setup is underway. Safety during setup is important, and privacy during a theater performance is essential. It would be appropriate to call (317) 231-0000 for Terry Hennessey, general manager for the lessee of the theater side of the building. Terry may have someone available to help conduct a tour, or may give quick approval for a tour directed by a Shriner, if there is no activity in the theater. As we respect the privacy of our lessee, we also assure pleasant and enjoyable tours for our nobles and their guests.

Tours of Shriners Hospitals: Self-guided tours of our hospitals cannot be permitted, due to HIPAA regulations that protect the privacy of patients. Our hospitals usually have specified hours for tours and have trained guides available. Those guides know the areas that can be accessed at specific times and can provide details about the hospitals. If a noble


would like a tour at a specific time, we suggest a call to the hospital a day or so in advance. This will enable the hospital to have someone available to conduct the tour.

In Memoriam:

Robert Emerson Hancock, Jr. was the 86th Illustrious Potentate of Murat Shrine in 1997. He passed to the "Unseen Temple" on Tuesday, August 19, 2008.

The Illustrious Sir was born in Indianapolis, IN, September 7, 1939, to Robert Emerson Hancock and Wauneta Mary Reynolds in Indianapolis. He married the former Suzanne Byrkit on June 17, 1961, in Indianapolis, who survives. They have resided in Carmel since 1971.

He is also survived by one son, Robert Emerson (Donna) Hancock III; one daughter, Lisa Louise (Troy) Hanna; two brothers, Thomas (Winnie) Hancock and Harold (Helen) Hancock; three sisters, Sharon (Paul) Thompson, Shirley (Jim) Cummings, and Jane (William) Nolan; and four grandchildren, Kyla Marie and Lauren Victoria Hancock, Spencer Cole Hanna and Hayden Christopher Hanna.

Past Potentate Hancock graduated from Broad Ripple High School in 1957 and attended Indiana University in Indianapolis. He was a member of Tau Kappa Epsilon Fraternity and was a veteran of the United States Air Force Reserve.

Professionally, Bob was a former part owner of HP Chemical Company in the late sixties and seventies. He was also the founder of North Side Carpet Cleaning and Office Environments, Inc. which operated McKelvey-Kell Carpet Cleaning and Clipper Cleaning Supplies and Repair. He was also the owner of Barrett Industrial Supplies and Barrett Taski Floor Systems. At the time of his death, Bob was the membership director of Field Service for the Indianapolis Valley of the Scottish Rite.

He had been a member of Meridian Street United Methodist Church for more than 40 years and had served the church as a trustee. He served Crossroads of America Council, Boy Scouts of America as a member of their board of directors, and was president of the Indianapolis Exchange Club.

Bob's Masonic career began when he was raised to the sublime degree of a



Master Mason in 1961. He was Potentate of Murat Shrine in 1997.

Most Worshipful Brother Hancock had served the Masonic fraternity as the 148th Grand Master of Masons for the Grand Lodge of Free and Accepted Masons for the state of Indiana in 1998-99. His service to the Grand Lodge of Free and Accepted Masons as an officer began in 1992. He had served as a Grand Lodge trustee. Recent duties included membership on the Foreign Commission, Relations, Historical Marketing and Public Relations committees, and the Indiana Masonic Home Board of Directors.

Additionally, Bob was commander-in-chief of the Indiana Consistory, Indianapolis Valley of the Scottish Rite, from 1986 to 1988 and president of The Cabiri International (the international association of Shrine past Potentates) in 2006-2007.

He was the very first recipient of the Medal of Honor given by the Indiana Council of Deliberation for the Ancient Accepted Scottish Rite in 1998. He received the 33rd degree of the Ancient Accepted Scottish Rite in 1988 at Grand Rapids, MI.

In addition to the above, Bob had a long and distinguished career as a Freemason.

He applied to become a member of Calvin Prather Masonic Lodge #717 on his 21st birthday. He served as Worshipful Master of Calvin Prather Lodge in 1991. He was a member of Prather Chapter, Royal Arch Masons #157; Prather Council #100, Cryptic Masons; and Raper Commandry #1, Knights Templar.

He joined Indianapolis Valley of the Ancient Accepted Scottish Rite in 1967 and became very active in the public dramatic plays and in the degree presentations. He became a Valley officer in 1974, culminating as being elected commander-in-chief in 1986. He further served the Valley as a trustee through 1991. Robert was best known throughout the state of Indiana for his efforts in Masonic membership development.

At Murat, Bob served as president of the Murat Chanters and the Caravan Club. He was an honorary member of many Murat Units and Clubs as well as the other four Shrine Centers in Indiana. He began serving on the Board of Governors of the Chicago Unit of Shriners Hospitals for Children in 1983 and was an emeritus member of that board. He was a member of the Royal Order of Jesters.

His other Masonic affiliations included being an honorary member of Mystic Tie Lodge #398, Indianapolis; emeritus member of St. James Conclave, Military Order of the Red Cross of Constantine, and the Indiana College Masonic Societas Rosicruciana. He had been awarded the DeMolay Legion of Honor. He also was the Indiana Grand Lodge representative to the state of Vermont

He received the distinct honor of being named a Sagamore of the Wabash in 1998, the highest award that can be bestowed by the governor of Indiana.

His hobbies included golf and fishing.

The funeral service for Past Potentate Robert Emerson Hancock, Jr. was held in the theater of the Scottish Rite Cathedral in Indianapolis, IN, on Friday, August 29, 2008. It was a grand tribute to his life in Masonry. He will be sorely missed.

Children to Grown-ups ... Making the Transition

Historically, patients with massive burn injuries did not survive. Until recently, survival has been the only key measure of a successful outcome for a seriously injured burn patient.

But as more patients survive large burn injuries, the burn team's focus shifted to quality of life issues and offering patients a chance at a productive life. Services that address the physical, psychosocial and vocational needs of burn survivors are more important than ever before.

About 14 years ago, the Cincinnati Shriners Hospital developed a plan to include a "transitions program" for young adult burn survivors. The process began as a multidisciplinary committee. As responsibilities of the group and patient involvement increased, the hospital dedicated a full-time transitions coordinator to organize the program.

Under the leadership of Lori Anderson-Stevens, our transitions program evolved from school re-entry visits and summer burn camp to a comprehensive program with the focus on providing adolescents with additional resources.

Currently, more than 900 teens and young adults are served by our hospital. The services offered from this program include resources to assist the needs of this population. By finding out how to job search on the internet, how to get health insurance, how to interview for a job, or where to get vocational training, the transitions program helps these teens take the first steps into adulthood.

Transitions recently expanded their services to include a quarterly newsletter, "Teen Connection," a transitions booklet, an assessment tool and a resource center at the hospital.

Lori and staff continue to identify patients who could benefit from these services. The resources assist in the psychosocial recovery as well as in their navigation into adulthood.

Our patients have come a long way and with the help of transitions, there is no limit to the possibilities that lie before them. The best outcome for all of us is a happy, healthy, and "ready to take on the world" young adult burn survivor.

Wearing a bright orange volunteer shirt, she asked if she could say something to us. We gathered the group consisting of Deo Carter, Mike Pearcy, Lee Langlotz, Randy Bell, Dan Gillahan, and me. Our visitor introduced herself as Jean Howard. She then said, "I'm one of your Shriner kids." She didn't tell us how old she was, but she told us she was the first child ever treated from Steuben County, near Angola, IN, by a Shriners Hospital. She said her treatment had been so good that it was only recently that she required a cane and brace. She wanted to thank some Shriners for what they did for her.

Finally, Jean had to get back to her station, but before we let her go, I asked my wife to take a picture of "our kid." After pictures, Jean left us. Firemen's Club

59 and Growing

The first meeting of the Murat Firemen's Club was held in the Kneipe Room of Murat temple January 5, 1949. Ray Cogan was elected president and Harry Branson was elected secretary-treasurer. Encouraged by Potentate Calvin Richey and Noble Harry Geisel, the Club grew in both membership and activities from a modest beginning that year under its first president to its present stature of more than 40 members.

The name "Murat Firemen's Club" was suggested by Noble Harry Branson and adopted at the second meeting February 17, 1949. The Club treasury was started by a \$10 donation from Potentate Richey and has grown until the services of a separate treasurer are now required. During that first year, President Cogan and Secretary-Treasurer Branson drew up the Club bylaws. The bylaws allow the Club to have Active, Associate and Honorary members.

At the beginning, our Club was a marching unit where we marched all across the country in various Imperial and Great Lakes Shrine Association parades. But in 1980, we became a motorized unit when the city of Indianapolis sold us a 1955 Maxim Fire Engine. This is the big "Red Fire Engine" you see when we parade at the Indiana Masonic Home and other parades locally and nationally.

The Club now operates with five principal officers, has dues, meets monthly, and participates in as many Murat functions as possible. It manages to have a good turnout at various events, in spite of the unique working hours of firemen, working three shifts of 24 hours each plus a Kelly Day.

Objectives of the Club are to provide Murat with a Safety Committee, while forming a social club for Indianapolis area firemen, both active and retired, who are members of Murat.
